PROPANE IS A HIGHLY FLAMMABLE PRODUCT AND MUST BE TREATED WITH CARE AND RESPECT.

Propane or LP-gas is by nature odorless and invisible. An odorant has been added so you may quickly detect any presence of gas.

Propane or LP-gas is heavier than air and will settle in low-lying areas.

IF YOU SMELL GAS AND CANNOT IMMEDIATELY FIND THE SOURCE OF THE LEAK:

- **DO NOT** strike any matches.
- **DO NOT** switch any electrical devices on or off.
- **DO NOT** use the phone in your house.
- Vacate the house.
- Call your LP-Gas company or fire department from a neighbor's phone.

IMPORTANT FACTS FOR GAS CUSTOMERS

You may own a buried gas line on your property. Examples could be lines to out-buildings, barbecues or gas lights. Alliant Gas does not maintain customer owned piping, but does maintain the line up to your gas meter. If your piping is not maintained, it may be susceptible to corrosion and leakage.

GAS PIPING SHOULD BE:

- 1. Periodically inspected for leaks.
- 2. Periodically inspected for corrosion.
- 3. Repaired if an unsafe condition is found.

Locating, inspecting, and repairing of customer owned buried piping may be made by a qualified plumber, or a heating / cooling contractor. Contractors may be found in the yellow pages under "Plumbers."

Do you or your neighbors have a gas meter at your home? This is an indication of gas service lines, and gas main lines that are buried under-ground in the area.

When excavating near buried gas piping, the piping should be located in advance and the excavation done by hand in accordance with Arizona Law. Please call the One Call Center prior to excavation at 811 or (800) 782-5348 if you need to have Company owned piping located.

When it is taken from the ground, propane is tasteless, colorless and odorless. To make it easier to detect, a harmless but strong-smelling odorant is added. If you ever smell this rotten egg-like odor, it may mean there is a gas leak.

Odor Loss is an unintended reduction in the concentration of the odor of propane, making it more difficult to smell. Situations that can cause odor loss include the presence of air, water, or rust in a propane tank or cylinder, or the passage of leaking propane through the soil.

Since there is a possibility of odor loss or problems with your sense of smell, you should respond immediately to even a faint odor of gas.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU SMELL GAS:

- Do not smoke. Do not use lighters or matches.
- Do not turn on/off any switches or appliances, including a flashlight.
- Do not use the phone in your house.
- Our personnel are available 24 hours a day.Phone (928) 474-2294
- Go to a neighbor's house and telephone the gas company.
- If the odor is very strong, call 911.

Propane is heavier than air and will settle in low-lying areas, so be especially alert in basements or crawl spaces. Appliances should be checked periodically, by qualified service personnel, to ensure their safe and efficient operation. That familiar blue flame that plays such an important role in our lives should, like other sources of energy, be treated with respect. Following a few simple guidelines can help ensure that you can safely enjoy all the benefits of propane.
